
Your Project May Need a Permit!

Strick compliance with the NJDEP
regulations apply to any land 50 feet
adjacent to the Deal Lake shoreline as
well as any land 50 feet adjacent to
any stream that drains into Deal Lake.



If you see an activity that will have a negative impact on the lake, report it to NJDEP. Your prompt action ensures appropriate actions are taken to address and lesson damage to the lake's water quality.

Regulations Are Complex! YOU MAY NEED A PERMIT!

Neither the Towns nor the Deal Lake Commission regulate or issue approval for work done adjacent to the lake by property owners.

Property owners should contact the NJDEP before beginning any maintenance or any construction along the lake's shoreline.


There can be consequences, including fines and time delays, for proceeding with work prior to securing the appropriate NJDEP permit(s).

The NJDEP recommends that any property owner, at a minimum, apply for a **Jurisdictional Determination** before starting any work along the lake's shoreline.

How can clearing vegetation, grading and building along the lake front hurt the lake?




HERE'S HOW:

- It destabilizes the lake's shoreline and stream embankments.
- It increases erosion and sedimentation, which make the lake muddy.
- Placing impervious surfaces along the water's edge increases runoff and flooding.

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What Else Can You Do to Help?

- 1. Don't rake or blow leaves and grass clippings into the lake, streams or storm drains.
- 2. Pick up and properly dispose of pet waste.
- 3. Apply lawn fertilizers as per state regulations. Better yet **don't fertilize your lawn.**
- 4. Don't dump oil, paint or any waste down storm drains.
- 5. Maintain a healthy, vegetated shoreline buffer.
- 6. Don't feed the geese.
- 7. Follow safe boating practices and don't make wake west of the rail-road bridge.
